Ways to spot a timeshare scam

Timeshare scams can often be spotted before you're victimized. Here are a few red flags to watch out for:

Unprompted initial contact

*Very few legitimate companies will reach out to potential customers without having first been contacted by you. If a company you've **never** heard of initiates contact by phone, fax, email or even direct mail, assume that it's suspicious activity. **Please, notify your Home Resort and Daily Management, Inc. immediately!***

Outlandish promises

Timeshare resale scammers often promise they have a buyer who is ready and willing to pay a lot in order to get you to send money. Be cautious; no one can promise a quick sale. If something sounds like it's too good to be true, it most likely is.

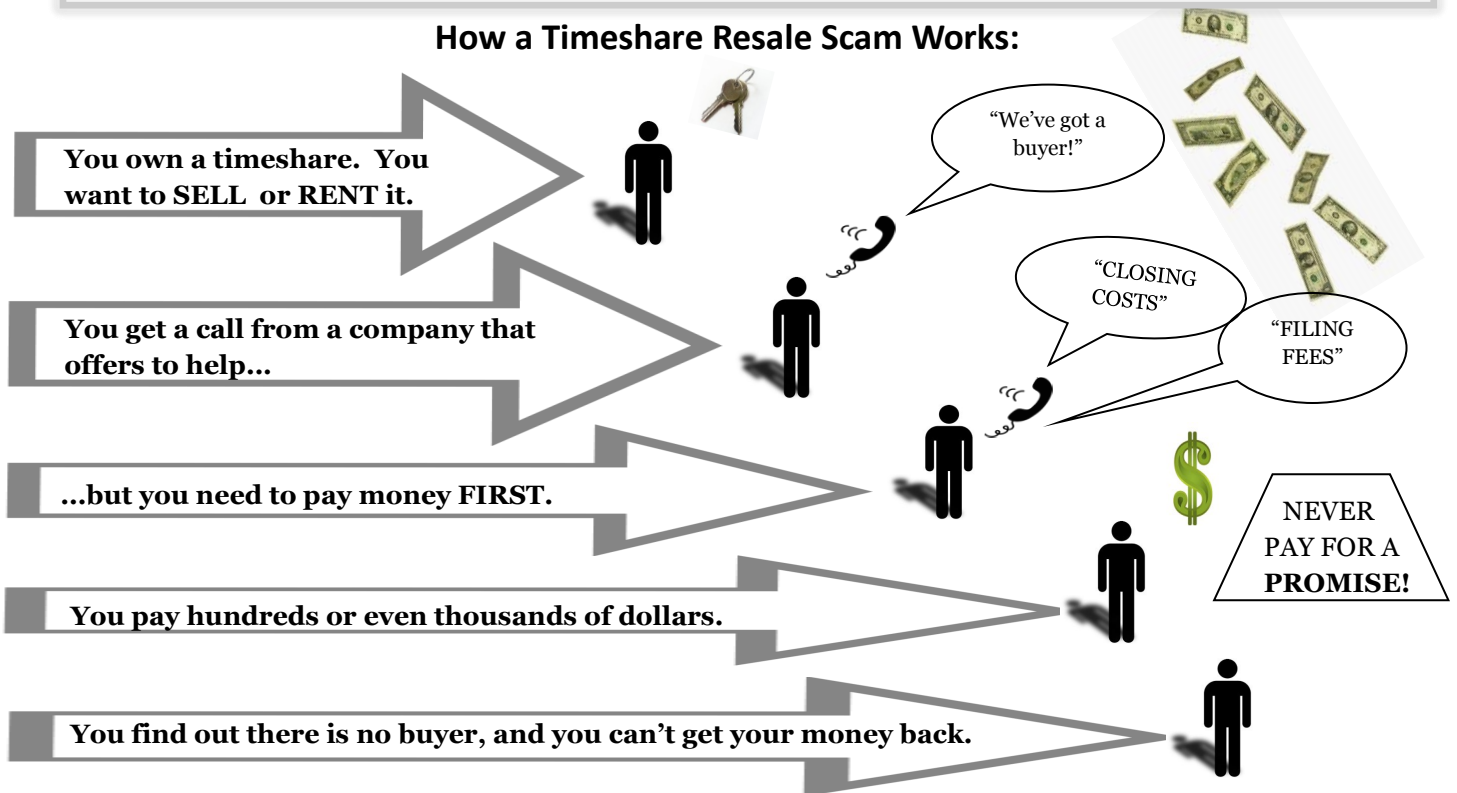
Upfront fees

*If any company asks you to pay out money upfront, **run**. This is one of the staples of a timeshare resale scam. Any legitimate company that will help you sell your property won't ask for hundreds or thousands of dollars before the sale goes through.*

Do your research.

Don't be tricked by a fancy address or professional-looking website. Contact the State Attorney General and local consumer protection agencies in the state where the reseller is located, as well as the Better Business Bureau, to determine if there are any existing complaints.
